## The Future Focus Committee

Before Christmas, the Future Focus group met several times to look at the strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats that are in our congregation.

We also looked at how our church is positioned in the community and areas for opportunity to further God's word to the people of

Chilliwack. While many may recognize this as part of a strategic planning process, we are hoping to use this information to make wise, God-pleasing decisions for our congregation's future.

We have been asked to look at options for when Pastor Lunderby retires in September. Taking a good, honest look at how our congregation is doing in all areas, will help us to more effectively recommend a course of action for September.

We have come up with 6 options to look at and consider for our vacancy period. We are not a call committee. Each committee member was asked to look at one option for the vacancy period. For some of the larger options we paired up.

Each option will be thoroughly analyzed and brought back to the committee where our committee members will get the opportunity to discuss the findings. Eventually we present the reports to the Board with our recommendation.

The Board will then bring this to the congregation. Our groups is really the ones that are gathering information so the congregation can make a wise decision about our future.

To help us, Pastor Mohns, who is the LCC Western Regional Pastor, will be coming to the lower mainland in February and I have asked him to attend our February meeting at the church. Pastor Mohns is well aware of Pastor Lunderby's retirement and he has agreed

to come out and meet with us to help us start down this path. We have also invited the Board to this meeting.

## St. Paul's Youth Need a Leader!

I have stepped into the Youth Director role at St. Paul's but cannot actively lead meetings and events because my own children are youth age. Our church needs a vibrant young adult willing to lead who is exemplary in faith and is someone our kids can look up to, someone who is not their own parent.

For many years now, St. Paul's has not had a youth program. This is not due to having no youth attending our church, but rather, due to not having a leader or plan



in place to implement a program. It is time for change.

Kid's Club is booming with an average attendance of 18-20 kids ages 3-10. Where do these kids go when they age out of Kid's Club? This momentum will surely be lost without a Youth program at our church.

8 kids attended our Youth Christmas party in December with only 3 attendees being members of our church. This ratio is very telling of the growth we could experience if we put the effort in. Pastor Lunderby graciously helped by leading the bible study but it was very exhausting for myself handling all other aspects of the event and I realized that Youth cannot move forward until more help is found.

Is it time to consider hiring a part-time Youth worker? With Pastor Lunderby retiring soon, this may come more to the forefront of our conversations.

What about volunteers? What would a volunteer Youth Leader at St. Paul's have to do? This role would require thinking of a game or activity,

planning it, and then also leading a bible study or devotion at meetings. The goal (to start) is to meet once per month. Ideally leaders will work in teams with at least one male and one female leader. The Youth Director takes care of all other administrative tasks. Please contact me if you would like to discuss the leader position or if you

have ideas.

We have again been invited to the Lutheran Circuit Youth retreat at Camp Luther happening this year from May 3-5. It is open to students in Grade 6-12 and we already have six people

confirmed to go. What a blessing! Please speak to me if you are interested in attending or would like more information.

I ask for your prayers for St. Paul's Youth ministry at this time, that God would reveal His plan, show us which doors are open and which direction we should go.

## Kids' Club is Diving into God's Word!

We are so thankful for God's blessings on our children's ministry, especially Kids' Club.

In December we had almost 50 children and their parents attend our children's Christmas party. It was a noisy, fun filled, Christ centered evening for the whole family.

In January we began a new year and a new curriculum entitled Scuba – Diving into Friendship with God. Each monthly lesson begins with a Chapel Time in which children and their leaders sing songs, learn Bible verses and are introduced to the Bible story of the day. Then children dismiss to graded classes to dive deeper into God's word with age-appropriate lessons. Then its dinner time thanks to our fabulous kitchen staff who whip up child friendly meals every month. After dinner the children can choose between games, crafts and other social activities. We are averaging about 20 children for the regular monthly sessions.

Our next big event will be the Kids' Club Easter Egg Party on Saturday, March 16 from 4:00-6:00 pm at Gwynne Vaughn Park on Fairfield Island. The large covered pavilion means this event can go ahead rain or shine because we can do most of our activities under cover .... And children really don't mind getting a bit wet while hunting for Easter candy!

We do need the congregation's help with this event. Due to parking and availability of materials we need to limit attendance to 48 children between the ages of 3 and Grade 5 ... plus their families. This means we need families from our church community to register early (like now!) and reserve spots for their children and the guests they will bring. We also need candy - LOTS of candy, to fill 500 eggs for the Easter egg hunt! If you are able to support this event, please bring wrapped candy, small enough items that we can stuff one into a plastic egg. Mini chocolate bars, "kisses" and those little packs of chewy candies are the perfect size. Please bring your gifts to the church office by March 3. We also need volunteers to stuff this candy into 500 Easter eggs! If you are willing to help please speak to Barb Schmidt.

Our other children's program is Children's Church. On Sunday mornings, children are dismissed shortly before the sermon for a lesson downstairs. They return to their families in time for communion. This program allows our children to participate fully in the worship service and to learn the liturgy and practices of our faith, but still receive some age appropriate instruction as well. Thank you to the dozen volunteers who take turns leading Children's Church each week.



## Missions and Ministry – sharing the love of Christ with others

#### NICARAGUA FEEDING PROGRAM

For the last few years we have had as our International Mission Project the Nicaragua Children's Feeding Program. Most of the Lutheran Churches in Nicaragua are in impoverished rural communities. Through the funding of the feeding program in those congregations children are given at least one nutritious meal per day.

Concordia Lutheran Mission Society has a goal for 2024 of raising \$20,000 for this project. We are hoping that our congregation can support this project with a minimum of \$500 raised. ### HEPING HANDS SHOWING LOVE

Once or twice a month we host a day of BINGO, music, games and fellowship in a safe caring environment for adults with developmental disabilities, mainly from the Chilliwack Opportunity Society.

Although COS is the main outreach, there are also a few church "friends of friends" who join in. St. Paul's does not supervise or provide food for the guests. We offer coffee, which their own staff distribute. People eat their own brown bag lunch. We call the bingo but do not make a penny from the 10 cent games. The players win the whole pot, maybe \$1.50 in coin. A donation to cover the cost of the coffee is an option for the players.

The next game is Feb 13 and it will be Valentine themed. Our regular volunteers are Donna Gafka,
