Hello everyone!

It has been a privilege serving as your Vacancy Pastor for the past few months. Even though my time here has been short, I've noticed that St Paul's is blessed with loving, faithful people and a strong ministry and mission.

Since starting here on November 13th of last year, there have been 20 pastoral visits, most of which were visits to shut-ins and people who are new to the congregation. I have led five worship services – three midweek Advent services, one funeral, and one regular Sunday service.

I have also attended 12 meetings, which include Governance Board meetings, a





Ministry Team meeting, and one very long meeting with the newly appointed Call Committee. Three confirmation classes have been taught, and the confirmation youth are looking forward to Confirmation Sunday on March 9th.

As you may already know, I am usually at the church on Wednesdays, but I can also be contacted at any time – especially in the case of a pastoral emergency – at either pastor.saviourlutheran@gmail.com or at 1-778-927-0975.

Call Committee Update

The Call Committee had its first meeting Wednesday January 29. The Committee is comprised of Paul Schenderling, Paul Schmidt, Donna Little, Martina Rohde, Dan Lillos, and Jonathan Wearing. As many of you may know, our congregation has not gone through a formal pastoral call process since 1988 when the Congregation called Rev. Stroup. Because of this we understand that the call process may feel new and unfamiliar to many in our congregation, so we want to provide a brief summary of the call process and what everyone should expect in terms of timelines.

The Lutheran Understanding of the Call: As Lutherans, we believe that the pastoral office is established by Christ for the preaching of the Word and the administration of the Sacraments. The process of calling a pastor is not simply a hiring decision but a matter of seeking God's guidance through prayer, reflection, and discussion. While we follow a formal and orderly process, we trust that God will ultimately provide the right shepherd for our congregation. The pastoral call is both a divine and human process: the congregation prayerfully considers whom to call, and the candidate, in turn, prayerfully considers whether to accept.

What to Expect in the Call Process: The Call Committee is currently working on completing the preliminary package that we are requested to submit to LCC via our Regional Pastor, Rev. Mohns. A key part of this package is the Congregational Profile, which is a 9-page questionnaire addressing various questions about our congregation such as statistics, demographics, history, strengths, weaknesses, and goals, etc.

Before we complete this package, we'd greatly appreciate the opportunity to hear from everyone. We will be distributing a survey to the Congregation so we can receive input on a few key questions. Paper copies will be available on Sunday February 9 and 16. Digital copies will be sent via email. After the survey, generally speaking, the next steps will be as follows:


 Submission to Rev Mohns. After the surveys are collected, the Call Committee will finalize the package and submit it to Rev. Mohns by February 21.

- 2. Candidate List. After receiving our package, Rev. Mohns will review it, and will send the Call Committee a list of potential candidates based on the needs of our congregation. Our understanding is we can expect this list approximately two weeks after we send our package.
- 3. Call Committee Review: The Call Committee will evaluate the candidates and, depending on the number of names provided, will prepare a shortlist. The Committee will carefully review each pastor's background and qualifications. We may also listen to sermons, review written materials, or conduct informal conversations to better understand each candidate before presenting the list to the Congregation. During this time we may also possibly reach out to Lutheran pastors from other countries, especially the Lutheran Church of Australia.
- 4. **Pre-Call Meeting**. A preliminary voters' meeting will be scheduled in mid to late March to present and discuss the candidates. At this stage, members may also submit additional names for consideration. If possible, Rev. Mohns will attend this meeting.
- 5. Call Meeting. A second voters' meeting will then be held where the Congregation votes to extend a call to one of the proposed candidates. The procedure for electing a candidate is set out in Bylaw 9A of our Bylaws. Once a candidate is elected, the chair of the Governing Board will immediately extend the official call. This meeting will hopefully be held in late March to early April.
- 6. Awaiting a Response. After the call is extended we will await a response. Our understanding is that it can sometimes take up to 6 weeks to receive a response. If the call is declined, we will return to the candidate list and repeat the process.

Please keep our Congregation in your prayers as we go through this process, that God may guide this process according to His will. Please feel welcome to reach out to anyone on the Committee if you have any questions.

Capital Campaign Update:



It is hard to believe that the capital campaign was first started in 2023. The idea for a capital campaign came out of the Future Focus Group at a time where we had just had the flood in November of 2022. The roof was clearly in need of repair and

then people suggested that there were a lot more things around the church that needed attention. The original plan was to fix the roof and then to fix up other things around the church that needed fixing or

improving to help welcome people into the house of God. We wanted people to feel comfortable coming to a building that is well kept and not falling apart. A target of \$100,000.00 was set.

The committee was made up of Paul Schenderling, Sandra Underhill, Barb Schmidt, Martina Rhode and me, Donna Little. We chose a bible verse that we thought was appropriate for what the capital campaign was trying to accomplish.

1 Corinthians 3:11 ... For no one can lay a foundation other than that which is laid, which is Jesus Christ.

We got input from a number of people in the congregation to see what they thought were the priorities and we came up with a list.

Next, we needed to get estimates on the work that needed to be done. The Board looked after the roof estimates and facilitating the repairs to the roof, as we knew that was an immediate issue.

Next, we put together a booklet outlining the needs and direction of the campaign. We still have these booklets in the office if you would like one. We put on several events, talked to different groups in the congregation and made a few house calls.

The money came in slowly but steady at a time where people were feeling a big crunch financially. It is amazing how God provides what we need (not want but need).

Statistically as of Dec 31st 2024

Total Revenue collected: \$53,716.27 Total Expenses: \$25,091.73 Balance: \$28,624.54

Of the \$25,091.73 expenses \$24,531.84 went

directly to the roof repairs. The balance (\$559.89) went towards new lights in the basement (\$401.15) as well as dumping fees and administrative costs for the booklets and events that we put on.


Confirmation Update

The Mission and Local Relief Ministry Teams have several opportunities coming up soon for you to bless others as you have been blessed by God.

GriefShare Ministry

What is GriefShare?

GriefShare is a Biblically-based ministry outreach to share the hope and promise of our Saviour designed to help people learn strategies to cope and grow in a most difficult time of their lives...the loss of their loved ones. It is a ministry that extends outside the church walls into the community, and brings them in. For people who have lost connection with a community, they experience love, warmth, acceptance, hope, and are encouraged to grow spiritually personally and with others. May God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit, always be front and center in this ministry and lead us all into His comfort and peace.

We Praise God, for the wonderful work He is doing. Broken hearts reaching out to comfort others, ministering from what they have learned, interacting with each other, and growing in their exercises. Some are seeking further Christian counselling and pastoral visits to understand how to deal with their emotional past. Some have started coming to church and are now actively praying for others, being a church to their friends. God is so good.

GS Scripture Theme:

Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of compassion, and the God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our troubles, so that we can comfort those in any trouble with the comfort we ourselves receive from God. 2 Corinthians 1:3-4.

GS Program:

- Arrive at 5 30, set up for our roles
- 6:00 Facilitators pray for members and session
- 6 10 Doors Open, sign in/business
- 6 30. Opening, prayer, object lesson, large group discussion, video
- 7 30 break, small group discussions, closing, prayer
- 8 30 departure, pack up
- 9 oo debrief, close in prayer

Expenses:

Freight and Exchange take a huge bite out of the budget. After budget for this year, shortfall was - 426.18, but donation was made, and we sold 5 STH books to another GS group, so shortfall is 116.18. I made 2 errors in exchange before visa came out, so I still have to adjust that with the accountant. I also have to submit the rest of the invoices as is included in this report. There are incidentals which are office supplies and I will submit those to Barb.

Learning Curve:

- Trying to use funds efficiently meant trying to order once for the year to limit the shipping cost. However, we couldn't predict how many people would register, still had to make a separate order.
- We may need to close off registration after reaching a limit. But everyone that registered needed to be here.

Needs:

- Logistic preparation for each session takes time
- The church has helped relieve a lot of the pressure by setting up tables/chairs and taking them back. They have also volunteered to help with refreshments.
- That allows us to focus on our roles and the needs of the members.
- It seems administration is a role in itself; it would be awesome to have another person help in this role.

Prayer Partners:

- For such a large group and variety of personal needs, plus the goals of each session, we really need people willing to pray for the group members and facilitators to be committed to the grief journey and do the exercises to help them grow more confidently in their new roles, and in their spiritual lives.
- We presently have 6 prayer partners, but we know others are praying privately for this GS group as well.
- It would be great to have a lead prayer partner to pass new prayers too.

Publicity:

- Word of mouth, is a great way to share what GS is about, especially from the members themselves.
- The Progress newspaper has taken GS as a news story, at no cost, and many people came because they or a friend of theirs, saw it in the paper, thus bringing people in that may not have a church background.
- It seems when someone speaks and presents GS to the congregation, there is more awareness. A few signed up because of that talk.
- Many people in the congregation may not know what GS is about.
- So, keeping the bulletin up to date on our current sessions, goals, or prayers is hopefully helping the congregation see how vital this service is as well as helping them understand how complicated grief is for their peers who may be going through the loss of a loved one.
- We are also putting the theme of the current GS session on the screen every week to encourage prayer for the group.

Facilitators:

- Cindy and Pastor Wayne initiated the GS
 program and ran it for 3 events on their own.
 They recruited Roger and Monica Pain, and Jeff
 Ayres. Monica was asked to take over as
 Program Director when Cindy and Pastor
 retired.
- Together we selected and invited more facilitators from the grief members that displayed mature faith in their grief and leadership and compassion. Some are from other churches.
- Ideally, each small group should have a male and female facilitator, which we had, anticipating 3 small groups, but since our numbers were so large, we needed to go to 5 groups the first night in 2025, the second night, we needed 7 groups. At which point, Pastor

David Hilderman stepped forward and asked if he could help.

Going Forward:

- After each session, we debrief sharing wonderful responses, discussion, suggestions.
- Following this 13-week event, we need to seriously pray about what the future will look like.
- Will we try and have a smaller group but present GS twice a year?
- Will we need more facilitators so that we don't burn out?
- Is it possible to have a designated pastor as part of the leadership?
- Due to US exchange rate increasing, will we raise registration to \$25 from current \$20 (Book is \$20 US)?
- Will we ask for \$5.00 registration for the 2 hour Events? We have always offered it free. (Book cost is \$7 US). Budget would take care of exchange rate, freight, taxes, and difference in currency)

Church Connection:

- On our display table, we have posters sharing information about our church prepared by Barb to let people know our community welcomes them to worship and to social events.
- They are invited to the Men's Fellowship,
 Birthday party event, Mom's and Tots, and
 Young at Heart.
- We also display Christian Counselling services,
 Community Helps including low cost food sources,
- We display GS Journals and Devotion book.
- They know the church supports GS and them with prayers, setting up tables, cleaning, providing refreshments.

Altar Guild



Praise God for 50 Years!



On Sunday, March 23 we will be thanking and praising God for the 50 years in which he has blessed the service of Rev. Dr. William Mundt. Pastor Mundt was ordained on March 23, 1975 at his home congregation of Crete, Nebraska

Pastor Mundt studied at the Lutheran seminaries in

Springfield, Illinois and Oberursel, Germany, receiving the Master of Divinity degree in 1974 from the Springfield Seminary. He later obtained a doctorate degree from Utrecht Seminary in the Netherlands.

He served a vicarage in Connecticut before being called to Grace Lutheran Church, St. Catharines, Ontario and then Bethel Lutheran Church in Kitchener, Ontario.

Pastor Mundt was active in the formation of Concordia Lutheran Theological Seminary in St. Catharines, first in preliminary meetings leading to its formation and then as adjunct faculty member. He entered full-time service at the seminary in August 2000, when he joined the faculty to teach dogmatics and evangelism. During his 15 years of teaching at CLTS, he also served at various times as Academic Dean, Dean of Students, Director of Field Education, Vicarage, and Placement, and Director of Development.

Dr. Mundt retired from full-time service at the seminary in 2015, though not from ministry to the church in Canada. He continues to serve regularly as a relief Pastor not only for our congregation at St. Paul's, but also for other congregations throughout southwestern BC.

On March 23 we will have a Mission Lunch following the worship service to thank God for the blessings of His faithful servant, Pastor Mundt. Lunch is by donation with proceeds going to support the work by Lutheran Church-Canada in Ukraine. Our Western Regional Pastor, Rev. Robert Mohns will also be our guest that day.


